Will Reconvene Developmental Center Task Force to Look At Ways to Strengthen Community System

Governor Brown signed the 2014-2015 California State Budget (SB 852) on June 20, 2014 largely keeping the funding intact in the plan sent to him by the Legislature although making several line item vetoes. A full copy of the FY 2014-2015 enacted budget can be found here: http://www.ebudget.ca.gov/.

For Developmental Services, funding was approved by the Governor for Early Start eligibility restoration to levels prior to the 2009 Trailer Bill Language changes, as were additional funding approved for minimum wage and overtime costs in response to changes in the state minimum wage and federal overtime requirements. A total of \$106.5 million increase was provided for the minimum wage increase per AB 10. The affected services are community care facilities, day program services, habilitation services, respite services, supported living services, and transportation. A total of \$17.3 million increase was provided to fund the changes in the Fair Labor Standards Act regulations to provide a 5.82% rate increases for in-home respite agencies, personal assistants, and supported living services to allow for the payment of overtime to individual workers. Additionally, the prohibition against payment of deductibles was removed authorizing regional centers to pay any applicable deductible for a service or support required in the person's Individual Program Plan (IPP) if the service or support is paid for by the health care service plan or health insurance policy of the person or his or her parent. There were also several recommendations of the Developmental Center Task Force that were approved consisting of developing crisis services at Sonoma and Fairview Developmental Centers, Community State Staff Program Expansion and the establishment of Enhanced Behavioral Support Homes and Community Crisis Homes. DDS also received a \$135 million increase to its loan authority for a total loan authority of \$395 million to ensure sufficient cash is available to pay regional center claims (Attachments #1-#3).

TRI-COUNTIES REGIONAL CENTER EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

July 11, 2014

The Governor vetoed the appropriation in the plan for Developmental Services that required the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) to spend funds for a study to review and recommend an update of the Core Staffing Formula for the regional center system operations budget and rate setting methodologies for regional center funded community based service providers. The Governor's rationale for vetoing the additional expenditure approved by the Legislature was that it would "create a significant workload and cost pressures within a restrictive timeframe." Instead, the Governor stated that he is "directing the Health and Human Services Agency to convene a task force to review both of these and other community issues that were identified in the Plan for the Future of Developmental Centers." Indeed, on July 7, 2014 the Brown Administration formally announced that it will re-convene the Future of Developmental Centers Task Force with a new objective to look at ways to strengthen the regional center funded community –based services system. The first meeting of the reconvened task force is scheduled to take place on July 24, 2014 in Sacramento. The meeting will be headed by California Health and Human Services Agency Secretary Diana Dooley and will be open to the public. Issues to be examined by the task force will include staffing levels at regional centers, community based services rates, and the impact of new state and federal laws and regulations on the Developmental Services system (Attachment #4).

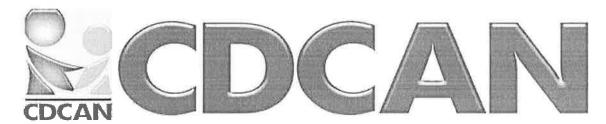

GOVERNOR BROWN SIGNS 2014-2015 BUDGET - MAKES TWO LINE ITEM VETOES BUT LARGELY KEEPS FUNDING INTACT AS PASSED BY LEGISLATURE

SACRAMENTO, CA (CDCAN - LAST UPDATED 06/20/2104 - 09:50 AM) - Governor Edmind G. "Jerry" Brown, Jr. signed, as expected. SB 852, the main budget bill containing the 2014-2015 State Budget, in San Diego this morning, making only a few line item vetoes but largely keeping the funding intact in the plan as passed last Sunday by the Legislature.

The Governor made only two line item vetoes in health and human services, and no real line item vetoes in education (except for deleting a technical provision) and no line item vetoes in higher education:

Funding for Early Start eligibility restoration, funding for overtime for In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) workers, additional funding for Supported Living Services, In-Home Respite and Personal Attendant Services for the impact of the federal overtime provisions effective in January, as well as funding for minimum wage impact for many regional center providers were all maintained in the budget. None of the Governor's line item vetoes in health and human services was to funding for actual direct services, but rather for studies for community-based regional center funded services - that advocates pushed hard for and also for implementation steps regarding federal mental health parity.

DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES

REGIONAL CENTERS: Governor eliminated the appropriation that would require the Department of Developmental Services to spend funds for a study with stakeholders to review and recommend an update of the core staffing formula for the 21 non-profit regional centers, and rate setting methodologies for community-based services and supports. The Governor stated that he vetoed the additional expenditure approved by the Legislature because it would "...,create a significant workload and cost pressures within a restrictive timeframe, Instead I am directing the Health and Human Services Agency to convene a task force to review both of these and other community issues that were identified in the Plan for the Future of the Developmental Centers."

MENTAL HEALTH PARITY ACT IMPLEMENTATION

DEPARTMENT OF MANAGED HEALTH CARE - Governor reduced additional spending of \$4,204,000 for the Department of Managed Health Care by \$2,102,000, to help the department in reviewing health plans' compliance with the federal law on mental health parity that is "consistent" with the department's implementation plan. The Governor stated that "In the coming year, my Administration, through the Department of Managed Health Care, will review health plan filings, and identify any areas of concern and any additional resources needed to address them. The Budget also includes an augmentation [increase] that was included in the May Revision for clinical and actuarial contracts that will further help with initial implementation."

DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE - Governor reduced item within consumer protection from \$749,000 to \$374,000 augmentation [or increase] for implementation of the federal mental health parity act. The Governor stated that "the augmentation that remains in the Budget will allow the Department to monitor health insurers' compliance with mental health parity laws and other insurance laws."

CDCAN will issue full report on the budget later today.

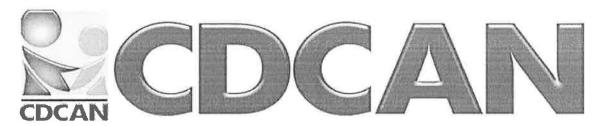

GOVERNOR SIGNS BUDGET TRAILER BILLS INCLUDING BILLS ON IHSS/SLS OVERTIME, EARLY START ELIGIBILITY RESTORATION

SACRAMENTO, CA (CDCAN = LAST UPDATED 06/20/2014 02:15 PM) - Governor Edmund G. "Jerry" Brown, Jr. signed today the main budget bill and 16 of 17 budget-related measures - called "budget trailer bills" because they follow or trail the main budget bill, to make changes or additions to State law to implement the funding in the state budget. The main budget bill and the budget "trailer" bills took effect immediately.

One bill – AB 1469 dealing with the State Teachers' Retirement System defined benefit program funding is the only budget trailer bill that remains unsigned – but will be approved next week, according to the Governor's office.

GOVERNOR SIGNED MAIN BUDGET BILL EARLIER THIS MORNING

Earlier this morning, Governor Brown signed the main budget bill. SB 852, in San Diego, with Senate President Pro Tem Darrell Steinberg (Democrat – Sacramento, 6th State Senate District) and Assembly Speaker Toni Alkins (Democrat – 78th Assembly District).

Brown said that "... this on-time budget provides for today and saves for the future. We're paying off the state's credit card, saving for the next rainy day and fixing the broken teachers' retirement system."

As previously reported, the Governor made only a few line item vetoes and largely maintained the funding levels in the budget as passed by the Legislature on June 15th. Only two of the line item vetoes were in the health and human services budget area and neither of those were funding for direct services, though the budget issues have potentially far reaching future impact. The Governor made no real line item vetoes in education (except for deleting a technical provision) and no line item vetoes in higher education Funding for Early Start eligibility restoration, funding for overtime for In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) workers additional funding for Supported Living Services, In-Home Respite and Personal Attendant Services for the impact of the federal overtime provisions effective in January, as well as funding for minimum wage impact for many regional center providers were all maintained in the budget

BUDGET TRAILER BILLS INCLUDE IHSS OVERTIME IMPLEMENTATION, EARLY START, FUNDING INCREASES FOR SUPPORTED LIVING, PACE AND CHILD CARE PROVIDERS

As previously reported, among the budget trailer bills the Governor signed – as expected – include bills dealing with implementing overtime under the federal Department of Labor regulations, effective January 1, 2015 for all In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) workers; restoration of eligibility for the State's early intervention program for infants and toddlers called "Early Start" to what it was

prior to the 2009 reductions; 5,82% rate increase for supported living services, in-home respite service and personal attendant services providers funded through the 21 non-profit regional centers to help fund the federal overtime requirements for those home care related workers that also impacts IHSS workers; funding to help off-set the increase on July 1st of the State's minimum wage for many regional center funded providers (with the exception of supported employment providers), increases in rates for child care providers and providers in the Program for All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE); and an increase in grants for CalWORKS recipients next year

CDCAN will issue report later today or this weekend on the complete details on what is in the budget plan as signed by the Governor.

NEXT STEPS

CDCAN COMMENT: The main budget bill has the actual funding numbers for every program and department funded or authorized funding through the State. It also contains what is referred to as "budget bill language" or "BBL" which is different from "budget trailer bill language" in that the language in the main budget bill is only good for that budget year, and generally the language only provides an explanation of the funding or some specific reporting requirements.

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ASSOCIATION OF REGIONAL CENTER AGENCIES ANALYSIS OF THE FY 2014-15 MAY REVISION AND BUDGET ACT MAY 14, 2014

The Budget Act for FY 20115 provides funding of the May Revision with some changes and additions. The following is a summary of the May Revision as previously presented and includes changes adopted in the Budget Act (in bold).

FY 2013-14 (Current Year)

1. CASELOAD

The November Estimate projected the regional center Community Caseload to be 265,709 consumers as of January 31, 2014. The May Revision decreases the January 31, 2014 caseload to 265,216, a decrease of 493 consumers.

2. PURCHASE OF SERVICE - \$ 19.6 Million Increase (0.5% Increase)

\$ 19.6 million increase to Purchase of Services over the November Estimate due to updated caseload and expenditure data. This results in a total increase of \$22.2 million over the enacted budget.

3. OPERATIONS - \$1.1 Million Decrease (0.02% Decrease)

A \$1.1 million decrease in OPS from the November Estimate due to updated caseload and expenditure data. Overall, this is a \$0.6 million net increase in OPS over the enacted budget. The changes include:

- \$2.1 million decrease to reflect updated caseload data and correct calculation of Account Clerks:
 - \$0.1 million increase in the Core Staffing schedule due increase caseload
 - \$2.2 million decrease in the Core Staffing schedule to correct the number of Account Clerks originally budgeted. Due to electronic billing the ratio of Account Clerks to total consumers in the Core Staffing Formula dropped from 1:600 to 1:800. However, in the May Revision for FY 2013-14 the Accounts Clerks were erroneously calculated at the old 1:600 ratio.
- \$2.1 million increase to correct the double counting of savings related to the 2009-10 Early Start Eligibility savings proposal.
- \$531,000 increase in case managers to meet HCBS waiver requirements to reflect updated caseload data.

- \$206,000 increase to reflect updated costs for various projects.
- \$66,000 decrease in the ICF-DD SPA Administrative Fees.

FY 2014-15 (Budget Year)

1. CASELOAD

The May Revision anticipates an increase of 9,480 consumers (a 3.6% increase) over the 265,216 consumers projected for January 31, 2014.

2. PURCHASE OF SERVICE - \$265.7 Million Increase Over Current Year (7.0% Increase)

- \$125.6 million increase over current fiscal year for caseload and utilization growth.
- \$127,000 increase in Quality Assurance Fees for ICF-DDs.
- \$3.1 million decrease due to the restoration of Medi-Cal benefits for Enteral Nutrition and some Adult Dental services.
- \$106.5 million increase for the minimum wage increase per AB 10. The affected services are community care facilities, day program services, habilitation services, respite services, supported living services, and transportation. (This includes a decrease of \$4.5 million for minimum wage increases for supported employment, which was originally included in the November Estimate. Supported Employment has now been excluded from consideration for minimum wage increases.)
- \$17.3 million increase to fund the changes in the Fair Labor Standards Act regulations to provide a 5.82% rate increases for inhome respite agencies, personal assistants, and supported living services to allow for the payment of overtime to individual workers.
- \$11.7 million increase (reappropriated from FY 2011-12) to develop community resources, including two new models of care for challenging behavioral needs, Adult Residential Facilities for Persons with Special Health Care Needs (ARFPSHN), and other needed services and supports. See attached Future Fiscal Issues, New and Revised Major Assumptions for more details.
- \$7.9 million increase for the restoration of the Early Start eligibility criteria to pre-2009 levels and restoration of services to "AT Risk" infants. NOTE: This restoration DID NOT include restoration of the non-Federally required services that were also cut in 2009.

Of this \$7.9 million, \$2.3 million was supposed to be for OPS. DDS has stated that they will do a technical adjustment before December 31, 2014 to correct this.

3. OPERATIONS – \$17.3 Million Increase Over Current Year (3.1% Increase)

- \$16.2 million increase in Staffing due to the projected increase in caseload.
- \$15,000 increase in case managers to meet HCBS waiver requirements to reflect updated caseload data.
- \$445,000 increase in Special Projects for:
 - \$351,000 increase in the Foster Grandparent Program.
 - \$90,000 decrease in Sherry S. funds.
 - \$169,000 increase for the Client's Rights Advocacy contract due to increased caseload numbers.
 - \$15,000 increase for Direct Support Professional Training
- \$865,000 decrease in Lanterman developmental Center Closure to redirect funds to CPP OPS.
- \$24,000 increase in the ICF-DD SPA Administrative Fees.
- \$136,000 increase for the minimum wage increase per AB 10.
- \$1.3 million increase (reappropriated from FY 2011-12) for CPP in OPS to reflect regional center staffing to support community development, transitions and necessary quality assurance and monitoring, and a quality management system for DC residents transitioning into the community.
 See attached Future Fiscal Issues, New and Revised Major Assumptions for more details.
- NOTE: Of the \$7.9 million that was added to POS for the restoration of Early Start, \$2.3 million was supposed to be for OPS. DDS has stated that they will do a technical adjustment before December 31, 2014 to correct this.

DDS Loan Authority

DDS received a \$135 million increase (a 51.9% increase) to its loan authority for a total of \$395 million to ensure sufficient cash available to pay RC claims.

Future Fiscal Issues and New and revised Major Assumptions

DDS listed three future fiscal issues which could have an impact on regional center costs. These are:

- Change of Rates for some Intermediate Care Facilities
- Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act Employer Mandate
- DC Taskforce Future Services for DC Residents

DDS also listed four items under New Major Assumptions. These are:

- CPP for Implementing DC Task Force Recommendations
- New Models of Care for Challenging Behavioral Needs
- Regional Center Staffing to Support Resource Development, Transition and Quality Assurance
- Quality Assurance for DC Residents Transitioning to the Community

DDS listed the increase in its loan authority as a Revised Major Assumption.

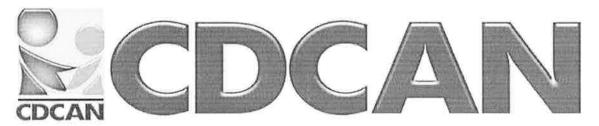

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State Capitol Update

BROWN ADMINISTRATION TO RECONVENE DEVELOPMENTAL CENTERS TASK FORCE TO LOOK AT WAYS TO STRENGTHEN COMMUNITY-BASED SERVICES FOR PEOPLE WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

SACRAMENTO, CA (CDCAN LAST UPDATED 07/07/2014 – 10:37 AM) – In what could be a significant step toward addressing what advocates and policymakers from both parties have called a major crisis in the regional center funded community-based system serving tens of thousands of children and adults with developmental disabilities, the Brown Administration announced that if will re-convene a task force with a new mission to look at ways to strengthen that community-based system hit since the early 2000's with major reductions in services, cuts and freezes in rates and reimbursements.

The Brown Administration is reconvening the "Future of the Developmental Centers Task Force" composed of stakeholders and headed by California Health and Human Services Agency Secretary Diana Dooley, that developed over 6 months last year recommendations on the future of the State owned and operated facilities that were widely praised by advocates and policymakers in both parties. The Governor proposed – and the Legislature approved – several initial steps toward implementing those recommendations as part of the 2014-2015 State Budget.

The first meeting of the reconvened task force is scheduled for July 24th in Sacramento. The meeting – like all the previous task force meetings – will be public, with details of meeting location and times and agenda to be announced soon [CDCAN will issue report on this information when it becomes available. Marty Omoto, CDCAN Director is a member of the task force).

People with developmental disabilities – including those diagnosed with autism spectrum and related disorders – may be eligible for regional center funded services – though many are not, under eligibility rules narrowed in 2005. Persons eligible for regional center funded services – and many of those who are not – may be eligible for other community-based services including In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS), Medi-Cal, special education and other supports.

TASK FORCE WILL LOOK AT WAYS TO "STRENGTHEN" COMMUNITY-BASED SYSTEM

Diana Dooley, who as Secretary heads the huge California Health and Human Services Agency that oversees the various departments dealing with Medi-Cal, developmental services. In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS), aging, foster care, CalWORKS and other services, said that the reconvened task force will develop recommendations to "... strengthen the community system in the context of a growing and aging population, resource constraints, availability of community resources to meet the specialized needs of clients, and past reductions to the community system."

Issues to be examined by the task force, according to Secretary Dooley, will include community rates, the impact of new State and federal laws and regulations, and staffing levels at Regional Centers.

Secretary Dooley, whose leadership on last year's task force was widely praised and respected by advocates and legislators from both parties, noted that "... this diverse group of stakeholders did a remarkable job coming together, setting aside differences, and producing a set of recommendations to chart a course for the future of the Developmental Centers. I believe this same group can build on that success by examining services in the community. By working together and resisting the inclination toward either/or thinking, we can focus on appropriate services for people with developmental disabilities, regardless of setting."

Former director of the Department of Developmental Services Terri Delgadiillo, also singled out last year for praise by advocates and policymakers in helping to shape the task force recommendations before her retirement from state service last December served on the task force and will have her spot filled by the new department director. Santi Rogers. Rogers, who previously headed for 18 years the San Andreas Regional Center in San Jose, was appointed as director of the department in March.

RECONVENING TASK FORCE IMPLEMENTS GOVERNOR'S LINE ITEM VETO DIRECTIVE

The 2014-2015 State Budget, as passed by the Legislature and signed into law by Governor Edmund G. "Jerry. Brown, Jr., in June, included some major funding increases and restorations to health and human services, including child care providers. CalWORKs grants, payments with certain restrictions of overtime for home care workers including In-Home Supportive Service providers (effective January 2015), and restoration of eligibility to California's early intervention program – called "Early Start" (effective January 2015) - but held off on restoring or unfreezing community-based provider reimbursements funded through the 21 non-profit regional centers under the Department of Developmental Services (DDS); restoring rates for many fee-for-service Medi-Cal providers; or restoring previously eliminated Medi-Cal benefits, cut in 2009, among the many services hit by previous reductions over the years.

Both the Legislature and Governor cited continued uncertainty in revenues and spending levels as reasons to hold off on those funding increases this year.

When Governor Brown signed the package of bills making up the 20140-2015 State Budget on June 20th, he used his line item veto eliminating the appropriation that would have required the Department of Developmental Services to spend funds for a study with stakeholders to review and recommend an update of the core staffing formula for the 21 non-profit regional centers, and rate

setting methodologies for community-based services and supports

It was one of only two line item vetoes the Governor made in health and human services – none of which impacted direct services.

In his line item veto message, the Governor stated that he vetoed the additional expenditure approved by the Legislature because it would "... create a significant workload and cost pressures within a restrictive timeframe. Instead I am directing the Health and Human Services Agency to convene a task force to review both of these and other community issues that were identified in the Plan for the Future of the Developmental Centers."

One of the 7 recommendations by the task force included formation of a stakeholder group to look at ways to improve the community-based system of services.

Noting the Governor's line item veto message and directive. Secretary Dooley said she was reconvening the stakeholder group "consistent with a recommendation in the [Future of the Developmental Centers Task Force] Plan and in response to Governor Brown's message in the recently signed Budget Act..." and "will be charged with examining services for the developmentally disabled in the community."

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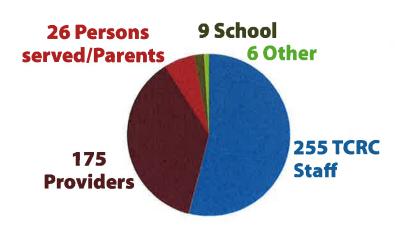

CHALLENGES

CASELOAD GROWTH

While 3-4% growth looks manageable in reality it translates to 400-500 more cases per year. This represents lots of paperwork, filing, recording, storage and distribution. 500 charts can easily look like 125 feet of paperwork, or 30 filled file drawers.

FLAT OR DECLINING BUDGETS

Our operations budget does not keep up with our caseload growth. This creates caseload ratios beyond what is considered ideal. If we do not or cannot improve our operational processes we do not stand a chance of keeping up.

INCREASED OPS WORKLOAD

New regulations and trailer bill requirements force us to do more than ever. Combined with caseload growth and declining ops budgets is a recipe for disaster

Taking the Fight to Washington DC

We are 100% dedicated to delivering services to people we serve in the most effective manner possible. We constantly strive to better ourselves and our "product" by evolving the services we fund as well as how we deliver the services. One major component of business is the creation and collection of documentation and approvals. Managing the process and retention of this documentation is an on-going struggle.

Over the years we have managed to digitize or scan over 5.3 million pages going back close to 15 years. This project, in it's 13th year, demonstrated the advantage of having digital records instead of paper. Not only does it save space and reduce rent overhead, it's more effective and efficient for recalling the information and distribution of the material as needed. Digital or electronic record keeping is here to stay and the benefits are extending beyond the file cabinet.

TCRC has pursued a digital strategy for anything and everything paper based. Every department is in someway moving toward a digital future.

One of our biggest obstacles is getting people and other organizations to adopt to some of our new methods. Electronic signature acceptance is one of our targets and we are moving ever closer to resolving the challenges we have faced. We have yet to convince everyone of the benefits and legality of electronic signature but we forge ahead knowing that it will happen soon.
